MY LIFE, YOUR FUTURE?

Who am I?

Hi, my name's Nick and I am the Senior Administrator for Professional Education and the Apprenticeships & Careers Team at Gloucestershire Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust. Quite the mouthful I know but this is the just the tip of the iceberg when considering what I do at our Trust and the teams I work with or support.

How did you get into this job?

After living and studying in Gloucestershire where I attended Sir Thomas Rich's School, I felt a change of scenery was needed and applied to attend the University of Derby where I studied Forensic Science with Criminology as I had a keen interest in this area. Upon completion of my Honours Degree, I struggled to find a suitable job in that area and moved back home where it was suggested by a family friend to apply for the role of Porter at the Trust. I hadn't initially considered the NHS as a career and while I did apply, I was not sure if the role would be for me.

15 years on I am glad I was proven wrong. Starting as a Porter was a great introduction to the NHS as while it was a demanding and energetic role, I got to meet a vast number of people in different roles and Departments and showed me the diversity of careers within the NHS. There came an opportunity when I applied for the role of Mortuary Assistant. While this may not be a role suitable for most people it was something that I was very interested in and played on my strengths, knowledge and skills from studying for my degree. I later achieved a promotion to Mortuary Supervisor and was able to support a number of changes and improvements to the services we provided within the Trust, while developing improved networks throughout the South West.

While I have had a varied career within the NHS (I didn't even mention training to be a phlebotomist!) it is my current role as Senior Administrator where I find myself today, after changing career direction a few years ago. I initially discovered Apprenticeships when I was asked by a colleague to do a talk and tour for some of our newly recruited Apprentice Healthcare Assistants to explain about the Mortuary Services. Little did I know I would end up working for their services instead a number of years later. While supporting colleagues from a variety of teams within the Education and Development Services, I have worked on a number of projects to support the training and education of staff within the Trust, as well as support the ever-growing workforce by recruiting apprentices into the numerous different career pathways within the NHS.

What's the best part of your job?

I would consider the best part of my role to be working with the teams to support newly recruited apprentices into their roles with the NHS, as well as helping arrange for current staff to access development opportunities such as apprenticeships and further training opportunities to develop within their roles and take the next steps in their careers.

Why I love Apprenticeships?

Having completed my degree then struggling to find a role that suited me, I wish I had been given the same opportunity to start off with an apprenticeship. I learned a lot from studies at University, but it was the practical experiences I missed which limited my applications for jobs within that area. The big part of an apprenticeship is the learning on the job. In my current position I was given the opportunity to complete the Level 3 Team Leader / Supervisor Apprenticeship where I achieved a distinction thanks to my hard work, and support from both my teams and training provider. I believe that Apprenticeships are a great way to get into a career, especially within the NHS.

Claire's Career Journey

Worked for 2 years as a clinical dietitian in Oxford, carrying out research identifying levels of malnutrition.

I joined a medical nutrition company, co-ordinating research studies and trials for prescribed medical nutrition feeds and supplements

I undertook freelance work writing medical nutrition articles, specialist updates and supporting UK wide malnutrition projects.

I now lead on Education and Training for the dietetic department part time, whilst also undertaking a small amount of private clinical dietetic work.

I returned to the NHS, working as a GI dietitian, setting up and leading specialist services. I also co-ordinate training our dietetic students.

- Dietitians are the only regulated health profession related to food and nutrition and are not any less qualified than nutritional therapists.
